You could have a vital piece of information and just not halfas how emportant what you know is to the Police. Residents and communities know what's happening in their area - so I would incourage you to 'Report your intelligence'.

Potce intelligence is information which the police receive or collect. It could be information about thrug dealing. It could be information about suspicious betterious. Or it, could be information about a possible thrink driver.

Something you've seen of heard may seem insignificant. But your information could be the missing poodle piece. It could help Donset Police catch a criminal and keep people in your community safe.

The Report your triutigence facility objects a wide range of information, but is designed to show that the reports are actionable by the police.

By collecting everything needed at the first point of contact you can be assured that nothing important is missed and you won't necessarily be required to append further time with separate calls or emails to the police.

Children as young as eight 'pretending to be drug lords in school playground'

Policing boss calls for 'generational shift' to teach youngsters about dangers of illegal subtances at younger age and more emphasis on risks of gateway drugs such as cannabis



From Harm to Hope

A 10-year drug strategy launched in 2021 - a substantial change in the way we will address illegal drugs in our society and mirrors my view that we need tough enforcement, effective rehabilitation, and impactful education particularly around gateway drugs



Making the South-West hostile to drugs Operation Scorpion 9, Autumn 2024



RECOVERING STOLEN GOODS



A digger that was reported as stolen from East Dorset was successfully located by officers in Poland.

Dorset Police received a report that sometime between 1am and 4am on Monday 1 April 2024 a Hitachi digger and JCB digger were stolen from a development site in Ringwood Road in Ferndown.

Following extensive enquiries and collaboration with the National Construction and Agricultural Theft Team (NCATT), the National Vehicle Crime Intelligence Service (NaVCIS), Polish police and Interpol, the Hitachi digger was successfully tracked down and located in the Pruchnik area of Poland in September 2024.

The digger has now been returned to its rightful owner.

PUTTING A STOP TO FLY-TIPPING

The number of Fixed Penalty Notices for fly-tipping has increased by more than three quarters in the last year.

Due to the hard work of Dorset Council's Environmental Enforcement team, which has been bolstered by the introduction of a jointly funded Enforcement Officer post by the Council and the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, more people have found out the hard way about the cost of committing waste crime.

Local authorities and the Environment Agency are responsible for investigating and enforcing the laws around fly-tipping, and since the new post was introduced last April, Dorset Council has seen a considerable increase in positive results.

The number of fixed penalty notices issued for waste crime has increased by 78 per cent, there has also been an 11 per cent increase in vehicles linked to waste crime being seized, a 43 per cent jump in fines for commercial waste tips and a 600 per cent increase in fines for household fly-tipping. In total, 53 fines totalling £16,500 have been issued in 2024/25 across the Dorset Council area.

CBO AFTER HUNTING INCIDENT

A man has been handed a Criminal Behaviour Order after an incident involving assault and theft from hunt monitors.

Following a detailed investigation led by the Dorset Police Rural Crime Team, Shane Chapman, aged 34 and of Verwood, pleaded guilty to two charges of assault and theft.

This was in relation to an incident which took place on Tuesday 26 September 2023 in which Chapman assaulted one victim and stole the property of another in the Minterne Magna area of West Dorset.

Following a further hearing, a five-year CBO was secured, imposing restrictions on Chapman including:

- Not to attend any location where there is a hunt taking place, whether that be pre planned, informal or organised.
- Not to attend, loiter or be near any hunt activity or to associate with any person linked with any hunt at the time of such activity. Should he find himself in such a position he must remove yourself immediately.

JAILED FOR 'SICKENING' VIOLENCE


Two men who filmed themselves torturing animals in a series of "sickening" attacks have been jailed.

Kristen and Todd Cooper admitted undertaking the cruelty in the New Forest, Hampshire, after the footage was found on one of their phones.

An expert described the videos of animal abuse as among the worst cases he had seen in 24 years, police said Kristen Cooper, 24, was jailed for five years, while 29year-old Todd Cooper received three years and eight months.

Police said the pair, who were sentenced at Southampton Crown Court, held down a deer and struck it down with a blunt object during one of the incidents.

Dorset Police, with support from Hampshire and Isle of Wight Constabulary, investigated the men, and carried out a warrant at Kristen Cooper's home in Bransgore in October 2022.






